A VISIT WITH AUBREY McCLENDON

During a recent trip to Oklahoma City, we had a chance to visit Aubrey McClendon, President and Co-Founder of Chesapeake Energy Corporation. We became acquainted with Aubrey after he graduated from Duke University in the early 1980's. We have followed his career and have invested with him as he started out in the critical energy business. As he gained knowledge and experience, he formed his own company and eventually became a public corporation listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

Aubrey gave us a tour of his campus-like office complex. The development evolved from his lease in a modest office building which he eventually purchased from the developer to the acquisition of fifteen adjacent acres with a stream traversing the site. With the help of his architect who he has been using for seventeen years, he transformed the relatively non-descript land into a waterfront park with numerous buildings, a gymnasium for employees and their families, and a waterfront solarium off the company dining room. This gymnasium, which has an indoor pool under the full basketball court, has won national recognition for a facility of this type.

As we walked through campus I could sense the mutual respect between Aubrey and his employees as he greeted many of them by name. It was obvious that his extensive recruiting program with colleges and universities was producing an energetic work force that numbers over 1600 employees. Their youth is evidence of Aubrey's belief in the bright future of the energy business as our national economy expands.

Perhaps most impressive was Aubrey's desire to give back. The ambience of the work place with its informal setting among the trees and low rise buildings has produced enthusiasm and increased productivity in his work force that he said is largely responsible for Chesapeake's success.

As his company grew, he has given generously to his alma mater, Duke University, and to many other schools and charities in the Oklahoma City area. PIEDMONT VIRGINIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE IS THE CLINT FOUNDATION'S NEWEST SCHOOL

Charlottesville, Virginia – Piedmont Virginia Community College announces the establishment of a special new scholarship fund thanks to a generous grant from the Florida-based Clint Foundation. Targeting working adults, these are generally part-time students, age 25 and over, who are attending College for the first time, or who may be returning to PVCC after a stop-out of a year or so.

To meet eligibility students must complete FAFSA applications and meet Pell minimum income requirements. Additionally, students who receive Clint Foundation funds must make a community contribution in at least one of three ways: 1) enroll in a PVCCC class that includes a Service-Learning component; 2) perform Work Study services for the College; or 3) provide fellow student mentoring and/or tutoring through PVCC's Students Learning Center.

PVCC is a comprehensive two-year college serving businesses and communities throughout the six counties of central Virginia since 1972. Recognized recently in The Wall Street Journal and USA Today as one of the nation's top community colleges, Piedmont Virginia Community College enrolls over 7,000 students each year and provides workforce and employee training programs at 13 different locations throughout Central Virginia.
